Pre-primary at Namaste Academy

Early childhood is the most crucial and important phase of development. Therefore, we foster a holistic approach that includes physical, social, emotional, and cognitive development which strongly affects a child's life success. We aim to create an environment of learning which is safe and secure, which the child enjoys coming to every day, and which could help to make a difference in their life.

Our programme includes their first individual adventure in Playgroup (PG) starting from two years where they are provided with an environment that encourages learning through sensory, creative, social, physical, and cognitive engagement up to Senior Kindergarten (SKG); to six years where they advance their skills in core academic areas including literacy, numerical, social, science, and ECA. Thus helping them to prepare for the primary level.

We have different spaces where students can learn and engage themselves, including an activity room, indoor playroom, playground for outdoor free play, and separate nap rooms. We also have a variety of flora and kitchen gardens which help them to generate curiosity towards nature.

Besides academics, we also make sure to provide them with extracurricular activities such as yoga, karate, dance, and music - as well as creative work to help them express themselves and develop their imagination, such as storytelling, art and craft, and drawing. We make sure to provide them with nutritious and well-balanced foods, as well as encourage them to maintain their health and hygiene - and in this way, we help them to create a strong foundation for life.

Take a look at some of these activities conducted at Namaste, which we have detailed below.



a. Festival Celebration: Christmas

As a part of our festivity celebrations in Namaste, our students explore and celebrate all major festivals in Nepal. We see it as a part of exploring world cultures, being a global village, and inculcating tolerance among the young ones.

Christmas isn't just a day, it is a frame of mind and a season of rejoicing and reflection. It brings with it the most wonderful time of the year filled with happiness, cheer, love, and friendship. The spirit of Christmas lies in the peace and joy of giving and sharing. And this festive fervour was multiplied further by the excitement and zeal of the little cherubs of Namaste Academy as they celebrated on the 23rd of December with a special programme held in the preprimary premises.

Grocery store learning includes using money and budgeting skills like how to navigate the grocery store, following a shopping list, understanding price tags and grocery ads, reading food labels, promoting knowledge of food groups, and practising reading and writing for effective independence in the community.

The programme aims to develop children holistically, intellectually, physically, socially and emotionally. Through interaction, discovery, and experimentation with their own world, our preschoolers are able to confidently cultivate their own problem-solving skills, abilities, and talents that will promote further education, learning and development.

Our teachers ensure that healthy, happy learning takes place through a variety of activities. And our team of professional, compassionate, and experienced teachers ensure lessons are planned to not only protect the well-being of each child but to also provide each child with numerous opportunities to develop their full potential.



c. Show and Tell Activity

To bring about the holistic development of each child, Namaste gives ample opportunities for students to creatively express themselves through a wide range of experiences. Youths in Politics

Since the end of decade-long civil war in 2063 B.S., Nepal has been established as a federal democratic republic. The country has held several elections and adopted a permanent constitution. However, although the system is stable, the politics aren't.

As Nepal is a parliamentary democracy, the stability is quite dependent upon the number of

heads supporting or opposing the leadership. In my opinion, "parliamentary democracy cannot offer stability and cannot respect political values" - in the context of Nepal. If we see our current government, the largest political party with the majority is in opposition and the third largest party is running the government.

Leaders are playing a game of numbers. It seems like politics is done just to gain power and a cruel leader turns subsequent leaders cruel. Because of this our democratic values and political culture has become so disorganised and degraded that youths no longer interpret the word politics in the right way and now the most common interpretation of the word politics in Nepal is "The Dirty Game".

In comparison to older populations nationwide, youth participation in formal political and electoral processes is comparatively low. Just like the phrase financial literacy, there's a term political literacy and many youths in Nepal show no interest in this. They consider themselves "apolitical" but they are actually "a political" person because every aspect of our life is influenced by internal as well as external politics. Health, education, jobs, the market, the economy, inflation, etc. are all determined by politics.

You may not care about politics but politics cares about you. Because of political illiteracy and the lack of interest in youths, they are not raising voices and questions. When the government announces or offers allowances and freebies youths stand and clap and cheer the decision - but nobody is questioning economic status, or security, or jobs. However, young people can participate actively in institutions and processes that influence their surroundings and lives in a variety of ways outside of traditional political and electoral structures and procedures - such as the national youth council, youth wings of political parties, and so on.

Youths must be able to think and question critically. We can never create a utopian society with the best political, social or economic values. But understanding the politics, building policies suitable for the nation, being a leader, and making the citizens prosperous and respected - these are things that youths can and must focus on, not only to gain power, but to become rising politicians.
