## Message from the Principal

This is the last newsletter for the academic year 2079 B.S., and I am proud to share how amazing the year was for us at Namaste.

Many students showcased their talents in national-level competitions and did really well. Some of these have included Super Dancer Nepal, where we saw Ridesh Bashyal (Grade 9) finish in the Top 6; Voice of Kids, where three of our students, Akash Mallah (Grade 4), Soumya Pandey (Grade 3), and Suhana Aryal (Grade 1) were selected for Blind Auditions; the US Embassy District level Debate Competition which our school actually won, thanks to Kiran Bhusal, Deepika Neupane, and Amit Kunwar (Grade 12) - and Kiran even won the best debater award, amongst the 66 participants; and the International Open Karate Competition in which four of our students, Dev Sah (Grade 4), Soham Pandey (Grade 4), Sanyam Kandel (Grade 3), and Aabish Gurung (Grade 3) participated and won medals - and Sanyam Kandel actually even went to Sri Lanka to represent Nepal in the International Open Karate Championship!

We are also proud that this year many students organised various events, wrote books, and consistently built their leadership through their journey at Namaste. In academics, we are also excited, as Grade 8 prepares for BLE, 10 for SEE, and 12 for their boards - and we are confident that our students will gain results that they will be proud of. Other grades are also putting in equal effort and where needed, receiving extra classes and support from the school.

While the final examinations are around the corner, our students are trying their best at school, but we do expect a certain amount of support and motivation at home too. And whilst results are important, we must also understand that they are no more important than the physical and mental health and well-being of our students.

As we end the year, we are also happy to announce that we are working on providing a British curriculum for students from Grade 1 to Grade 7, and once we partner with Cambridge UK after the permission from the Ministry of education, we will officially become a British International School. We hope therefore that we will receive support from the parents as we continue on this journey.

## Primary Level at Namaste

Primary level ranges from Grade 1 to Grade 5 and each section is divided into levels. The Primary Level at Namaste Academy focuses on Activity Based Learning as this learning helps in a basic level of understanding of various concepts and skills that students use throughout their lives.

In this way, we positively encourage our children and nurture creative expression in classroom activities. And all the children are given ample opportunities to take part in creative activities, such as art, as it helps to develop their creative potential, sharpens their minds, and boosts their academic performance.

Primary education imparts students with core skills that will provide a foundation for the rest of their academic careers. Young learners are also taught life skills such as reading, writing, spelling, and interpersonal communication - and Bloom Taxonomy and Multiple Intelligence are applied in teaching to work on these skills among students.

## a. Club Classes

Club Classes help to develop conversation, storytelling, creative writing, reading, and mathematical skills.

During classes, activities take place which are focused on students learning through games such as Flashcards, Hot potato, Gallery Walks, Bingo, Word Games, and Quiz Contests etc - based on the content that they learn in their class. There is also a Spelling Bee, where the objective is to learn new words and improve pronunciation and sentence formation.

Club Classes at primary level are fun based but educational. Students enjoy gaming activities and making models. Students also learn through presentations, handouts, and worksheets - as visual classes are prioritised in order to help students to better understand the relevant topics.

## b. ECA / CCA

Extra-Curricular Activities & Co-curricular activities at primary level supplement regular class learning. All students are prioritised and encouraged to participate as these activities help in their overall development – including their moral values, attitude, skills, & creativity. These activities are mandatory for primary-level students because, with the help of these activities, they can

also learn to communicate, cooperate with others, and enrich themselves with life experiences.

In addition to all of the possible ECAs and CCAs, Library Classes at Primary level play a significant role in shaping young students' reading skills. In using the library they are learning not only to read but also to learn to issue and deposit books, write book reviews, and have book discussions.

## c. Experiential Visit

Primary-level students visit various places of different significance as a part of their field trips and excursions. These visits enhance their learning experience through observation, meeting new people, and doing documentation work and presentations during and after their visits as assignments.

## Book Review: "121 classic Poems"

"Poetry is the spontaneous overflow of powerful feelings and emotions recollected in tranquillity."

The title of this book I am going to review is "121 Classic Poems". It is compiled and edited by Prashant Gupta and published by Manoj publications.

It was just another day at the library when I came across this book. As I am interested in songwriting and lyricism, I feel like drawing inspiration from literally everywhere is really important. And I believe I can draw them more from the books I read. A poem is a piece of writing wherein the words are chosen for the sounds and images they suggest, not for their obvious meanings. So naturally, the phrasing in a poem is something that makes it special.

As the title suggests there are 121 poems composed and written in this book, and my favourites are as follows:

#### • Though I am Young and Cannot Tell

This poem is trying to display the connection between love and death and examine their relationship. At first, the poet does not know much about love and death but as the poem develops, I was able to learn the similar effects that they have. The poem explains that both love and death can feel like salt in a wound and that love can lead to death as well. Love is described as heat, and death is described as cold and "extreme to the touch". I reached the conclusion that love corresponds with death in unthinkable ways.

## Success is Counted Sweetest

This poem claims that the people who always fail are the ones who appreciate success the most. And I think in a way this is true. To taste something sweet like success you really need to work hard. Only a dying soldier can fully understand victory because the distant echoes of celebrations are agonisingly clear.

## When I Am Dead, My Dearest

The poet tells her loved one that when she is dead he should not sing sorrowful songs for her or plant any roses or shade-giving cypress trees by her headstone - and instead to just let the grass be green so that she won't see any gloom or feel the sadness of rain. She won't be able to hear the nightingale sing as if it was hurting nor is she sure that she will remember her dear in the half-light of the dead.

I love poems but sometimes it's frustrating to interpret what it actually means because the phrasing is in fact quite difficult to understand. I hope I was able to translate some poems into their actual meanings. This book is indeed a masterpiece and my gratitude towards the librarian is huge.
